

IN THE WORLD OF GENOMICS.....

"Facts are not science - as the dictionary is not literature."

Science is a collection of magical stimuli that inspire the human brain to question the very foundations of the world around it, redefine its understanding of what it perceives, and challenge the societal currents of convention. The real thrill of learning 'science' lies in diving deep into the murky waters of confusion and exploring the realm of the unknown.

Therefore, Adamas World School firmly believes in sculpting students who will not just watch the apple fall but question its fall - who will never get tired of saying the magical three-lettered word 'Why?'.

Keeping this vision in mind, the Science Department of AWS took the young Adamites, bubbling with curiosity, on a timeless scientific expedition to the world of human genomics through an interactive session on "DNA: Celebrating Our Shared Humanity" at the Birla Industrial and Technological Museum (BITM), Kolkata, on April 26 this year.

Popular Talk

The conference hall of BITM was packed with more than 150 students from different schools, colleges, and research institutes across Kolkata. The sense of eager anticipation in the air was complemented by excited murmurs from every corner of the auditorium, as the students waited with bated breath for the arrival of Dr. Partha Pratim Majumdar.

Meanwhile, they were introduced to the hosts of the session-stalwarts in the field of Genomics: Prof. Arindam Maitra, President of the Calcutta Consortium on Human Genetics, Prof. Bhaswati Pandit, Secretary of the Calcutta Consortium on Human Genetics and Shri Arnab Chatterjee, Director of BITM.

Dr. Partha Pratim Majumdar holds the National Science Chair (Scientific Excellence) of the Science and Engineering Board, Government of India, and is the founder of the National Institute of Biomedical Genomics in Kalyani. His talk on "Genomics: What's All This Excitement?" was the star attraction of the day. Murmurs subsided, and silence enveloped the hall when he finally began his talk, captivating the audience with his enchanting words.

WHAT IS GENOMICS?

Genomics is an interdisciplinary field of molecular biology focusing on the structure, function, evolution, mapping, and editing of genomes. A genome is an organism's complete set of DNA, including all of its genes as well as its hierarchical, three-dimensional structural configuration.



Key Takeaways

Prof. Majumdar began by showing a short film by the National Human Genome Research Institute, USA, which outlined some lessons the scientific community had learnt from the Human Genome Project.

His talk shed light on how our genes are responsible for every aspect of our being and the role genome sequencing will play in the future of medical treatment:


- Study of the patient's family medical history and his/her genes can help to reveal his/her affinity for plausible diseases.
- Genome Customized Medication is the future of medicine since it is targetspecific and is a way more efficient methodology for disease diagnosis and treatments.

The Future of Genomics



Prof. Majumdar concluded his wonderful and enlightening session on human genomics by showing us a video titled "The Future of Genomics: 10 Bold Predictions" (narrated by Prof. Siddhartha Mukherjee, Columbia University).





The Ten Bold Predictions

- "While most of these predictions are unlikely to be attained by 2030, achieving even one or more of these by that time would have a lasting impact on science, medicine, and society."
- -Prof. Siddhartha Mukherjee
- 1. Generating and analyzing a complete human genome sequence will be routine for any research laboratory, becoming as straightforward as carrying out a DNA purification.
- 2. The biological function(s) of every human gene will be known; for non-coding elements in the human genome, such knowledge will be the rule rather than the exception.
- 3. The general features of the epigenetic landscape and transcriptional output will be routinely incorporated into predictive models of the effect of genotype on phenotype.
- 4. Research in human genomics will have moved beyond population descriptors based on historic social constructs such as race.
- 5. Studies that involve analyses of genome sequences and associated phenotypic information for millions of human participants will be regularly featured at school science fairs.
- 6. The regular use of genomic information will have transitioned from boutique to mainstream in all clinical settings, making genomic testing as routine as complete blood counts.
- 7. The clinical relevance of all encountered genomic variants will be readily predictable, rendering the diagnostic designation 'variant of uncertain significance (VUS)' obsolete.
- 8. An individual's complete genome sequence, along with informative annotations, will, if desired, be securely and readily accessible on their smartphone.
- 9. Individuals from ancestrally diverse backgrounds will benefit equitably from advances in human genomics.
- 10. Breakthrough discoveries will lead to curative therapies involving genomic modifications for dozens of genetic diseases.

A half-hour lunch break after Prof. Majumdar's enthralling talk was followed by an Open-House Quiz on topics like Heredity, Genetics, and Evolution. The Adamites wholeheartedly took part in the quiz, brainstorming solutions and winning small tokens of appreciation for every correct answer.

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And somewhere in that shared silence, the boy under the Chhatim tree smiled.


